The issue of Missing and Murdered Women affects society as a whole. The denigration of Women's Lives is felt in all sectors of the community.














What is Red Dress Day?

Red Dress day is a day to commemorate and memorialize the lost lives of Indigenous Women, Girls and Two Spirit people who have been murdered, abused, violated, trafficked, discriminated against, disenfranchised, or gone missing from our society.

Missing and Murdered Indigenous people are found in all socio-economic backgrounds, all age groups, all communities and circumstances. And they are systematically underreported.













Native Women's Association of Canada (NWAC) has created a database of Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women, Girls and Two Spirit People:

- 67% are murder cases (homicide or negligence)
- 20% are cases of missing women or girls
- 4% are cases of suspicious death—deaths regarded as natural or accidental by police, but considered suspicious by family or community members
- 9% are cases where the nature of the case is unknown—it is unclear whether the woman was murdered, is missing or died in suspicious circumstances.

Every year Indigenous people go missing. Little is done to search for them or to investigate their demise.

In 2016, a National Inquiry into Murdered and Missing Women and Girls began. The Final report was presented on June 3, 2019. The report entitled "Reclaiming Power and Place: The Final Report of the National Inquiry into Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls" highlighted 231 Calls To Justice.

Government and policing responses continue to be slow.

Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women, Girls and Two Spirit People statistics continue to rise. All aspects of our community are affected.

Make a difference by living out the TRC's Calls To Action.




Help out with a clothing or food drive.
